Our Life Enrichment staff work hard to make the connections between our residents and those in the community, especially children. I myself have three young boys (ages 7, 4, and 1) and have always made a point to bring the kids in and help them develop lasting friendships with those who live at The Households.

Last summer I invited my children's daycare to visit. Story Book Child Care, run by Mariah Duszynski, is a mere three blocks from The Households. The kids in her care range from infant to 1st grade. Since last June, the

daycare kids (or as we call them, our Grand Friends) have visited us twice each month. We have done a variety of activities together, but more importantly is the relationships that have developed.

My own son, Charlie, who is 18 months now, has connected with the residents in amazing ways. He and I start and end each visit with high fives, knuckles, or waves to each resident. He lets them pinch the baby fat on his arms and stomach, kiss his pudgy little hands, tickle him, and blow raspberries. My heart melts as I see how they love one another.

We have some residents who prefer not to attend group activities, but love Grand Friends. Our residents light up when the kids come. Recently, a baby joined the group and the residents enjoyed holding her and feeding her a bottle. The older kids engage with the residents by doing activities together or performing for them. We enjoyed a magic show and a comedy hour from my oldest, Jerry. Another joy has been reminiscing about raising kids. When my middle son, Henry, got a pile of slime stuck in his hair during one visit, I felt a true bond with the women in the group as they remembered removing bubble gum from their children's hair!

We are all so grateful for our Grand Friends! They bring life to the residents, and they share a love and bond that is truly one of a kind. Come join the fun!

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Family Legacy

When I was a young girl I remember visiting my great uncle Fred Wilson in the old Bethany Manor. I learned at a very early age from my mother, that Fred was cared for by his family and he worked on the family farm most of his life. The family was thankful that he had a safe and warm place to live. He was a quiet, reserved man who offered me candy while visiting and as a young child I felt good that he had a nice room to live in with big windows.

As I grew up I became more familiar with some of the issues facing my grandparents as they aged. I learned that they were counting on Bethany Manor when they faced a time when they could no longer care for themselves or each other. I first visited the "new Bethany" when my grandmother needed skilled care

there long before she became a permanent



resident along with her husband in the last years of their lives. My parents spent many days visiting there. They were impressed with the quality of care Magnus and Ella were receiving, which led to their decision to support and promote Bethany to others.

After my father retired from his career he became a member of Bethany's foundation board and the rest is history. He was hooked on Bethany. The time came when my parents knew they needed to downsize, get out from under snow removal and yard work. While it wasn't easy to unload "stuff" from fifty years of living in

the same home, peace of mind was knowing that Timberland Village was to be their new home. Like my dad, my mom was content and proud of the place she now called home.

My parents liked the fact that because of the Bethany Life mission they would be near each other should one, or the other, need a different level of care. When my father was involved in an accident that eventually took his life eight years ago, my mother was able to continue to live in her twin home until she needed more care. Before she passed away last summer, she had lived in three different places within the community because of her changing needs. Each transition was smooth and effortless because of the caring staff and administration. At the end of my mother's life it

was clear the nursing staff and Chaplain Dave knew how to help us with the last transition to mom's Eternal Home. We were comforted in our grief by their loving care and concern, hospitality and warmth.

The legacy of Bethany has been well established in my family. This legacy of respect for the elderly and their needs has been passed to my brother and me. In dad's, and subsequently, in mom's last days, Bethany Life cared for my parents with dignity and faith. Ike and Sedahlia Blessing



When I think about Ike at Bethany Life, I'm drawn to something he told our friend Ed Ruppert and me just days before his death. We were talking about memories and the conversation turned to his time at Bethany Life. Ike talked about being treated well – "They treat me like a king here!" – and Ed commented "That must say something about you as a person." After some thought, Ike

said, "The people here have been a blessing to me" and then he seemed to reflect a bit, and as if not wanting to praise himself, said, "And (pausing) I guess I have been a blessing to them as well."

When Ike entered Bethany with a broken arm, he focused on when he'd go home. However, as time passed his thinking changed, and he began to realize he felt safer there than at home, where he had fallen. At Bethany Life, he had better equipment and two people assisting him when he needed to transition. So afraid of having that fall that might end his life, he soon opted to stay there. As a LifeChoices at Bethany member the decision was made much easier.

The staff was so very warm and caring to Ike and gained our respect and love. They came up with solutions he needed as his myositis progressed. One such solution involved his decreasing ability to swallow and bend his neck to get to his straw to take in liquids. We brainstormed with the dietitian who found a source that supplied "long straws!" Soon afterwards he needed all of his food pureed into a liquid so he could drink it through the straws. We contacted Chef Chris and his staff began to puree each dish Ike ordered, including his favorite chocolate pie! Shortly after Ike's first all-liquid lunch, I arrived and asked about his new food. His response was physical and verbal -- he threw back his head, formed his face into an "Oh my gosh it was so good!" look, and said, "YUMMM-MY!" It made all the difference.

Yes, Bethany Life was a blessing to Ike and Ike was a blessing to them. "Thank you" to every person who cared for Ike to make his life safe, comfortable, and fun. And through your loving care, you helped him feel and know that he could add to your lives. Blessings to all of you! - Sedahlia Crase

Tradition of benevolence



817 Cedar Street is where I lived from 1958 to 1962. My grandparents lived in that house for many years prior to then. Right across the street from my house was "The Old Peoples Home". That is what it was called at that time and is now known as Bethany Life.

It had the longest and best sidewalk for roller skating, riding my bike, jumping rope or playing hopscotch. In the summer residents would sit out on the lawn or up on the huge porch and I would visit with them every day.

My grandmother worked at the Old Peoples Home before Story City got their hospital. Once a hospital was built, she worked at the hospital with old Dr. Lekwa.

When my grandmother was older she was a volunteer at Bethany Manor. My mother was a volunteer also.

My grandmother and my grandfather were both residents at Bethany Manor as they aged. My mother passed away at Israel House after living at Cedar Place with my Dad for three months. My Dad continued to live at Cedar Place for another six years before going to Bethany Manor where he spent the last month of his life.
